












In Belo Horizonte, in Brazil, the excavation for iron has brought, together with new jobs, the destruction of a vast area of forest.





I HAVE SOMETHING TO HIDE

Installation, Video, 2008

In the spring of 2008, in collaboration with a group of students from the Sandberg Institute, I built a Pigeon House at the 11th floor of the "Post CS" building in Amsterdam, the Netherlands. After training a group of homing pigeons, we used these birds to deliver messages, in order to communicate secretely/privately with each other. During one month time we didn't use emails and mobile phones. This symbolic action, inspired by Giorgio Agamben's "The State of Exception", has caught the attention of several media in the Netherlands and abroad. Its political meaning is the one of making a statement about the topic of privacy, the treatment of personal information, and more in general, about freedom.
